Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz

Early Dreams is a journey of the senses through the passionate poetry of Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz (1648-1695), a legendary figure of the Mexican Baroque. Inflamed with an inextinguishable desire to learn, and to love, she was in turn a writer, mystic, scientist and musician, defying the laws and constraints of her era. To remember this extraordinary woman we selected some of her poems and set them to music over well-known bass lines of the period, drawn primarily from the works of Lucas Ruis de Ribayaz (ca.1626-ca.1667), Gaspar Sanz (ca. 1640-ca.1710) and Santiago de Murcia (ca.1682-ca.1740): Spanish composers whose works were widely performed in 17th and 18th century Mexico. We moreover commissioned music from the Canadian composer Michael Oesterle, who shares our fascination for the poetry and times of Sor Juana. Françoise Atlan, a long term collaborator of the ensemble, lent her warm and unique voice to the project. The dialogue between the Baroque guitar, the Persian setar, the viola da gamba and the percussion instruments produces a unique sound, characteristic of our group: a sound both ancient and modern, Mediterranean and middle-Eastern, which we take today to New Spain. The result is a scintillating, virtuoso dialogue based on respect and admiration for a woman who was among the greatest scholars in Latin American history: Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz.
